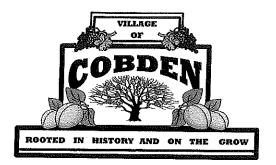

This report is intended to provide you with important information about your drinking water and the efforts made by the Cobden Municipal Water System to provide safe drinking water.

The source of drinking water used by Cobden is ground water.

### Source of Drinking Water

The sources of drinking water (both tap and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals, and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or results from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming,
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoffs, and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.
- Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicated that water poses a health risk. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. We cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. ### **Source Water Assessment**

The source water assessment for our supply has been completed by the Illinois EPA. Source of Water: COBDEN to determine Cobden's susceptibility to contamination, a Well Site Survey, published by 1990 by the Illinois EPA, and the Source Water Protection Program completed by the facility, were reviewed. Based on the information contained in these documents, seven potential sources of groundwater contamination are present that could pose a hazard to groundwater pumped by the Cobden Community water supply wells. These include an above ground petroleum storage, a warehouse, a manufacturing process, an auto repair, a vehicle parking, a domestic waste water treatment, and a machine shop/shed. The Illinois EPA has determined that the Cobden wells are susceptible to IOC, VOC or SOC contamination. This determination is based on a number criteria including: monitoring conducted at the well, monitoring conducted at the entry point to the distribution system, and the available hydro geologic data for the well. A possible engineering defect exists at both wells. Because these wells do not have properly sized casing vents, the vacuum created when water is pumped could induce surficial waters to flow into the well if there is a breach in the casing. Another possible engineering defect exists at well #1. This is due to the fact the hose from the air release vent is arranged so that it could siphon the poor quality water of the drainage from the packing gland into the raw water of the well.
